355. S 625. Bankruptcy Overhaul/Health Care Facility Bankruptcies. Grassley, R-Iowa, amendment that would establish a set of protections for patients of hospitals and nursing care facilities when the facility files for bankruptcy. The proposal also would require the attorney general and the Health and Human Services Department to establish a policy and protocols for coordinating a response to bankruptcies of health care facilities. Adopted 94-0: R 53-0; D 41-0 (ND 34-0, SD 7-0). Nov. 8, 1999.

356. S 625. Bankruptcy Overhaul/Democratic Minimum Wage Increase. Domenici, R-N.M., motion to table (kill) the Kennedy, D-Mass., amendment that would increase the minimum wage by \$1 an hour over two years, to \$5.65 an hour beginning Jan. 1, 2000, and to \$6.15 an hour beginning Jan. 1, 2001. The amendment also would provide \$9.5 billion in tax cuts over five years, offset by extending the Superfund tax and eliminating some corporate tax breaks. Motion agreed to 50-48: R 50-4; D 0-44 (ND 0-37, SD 0-7). Nov. 9, 1999. A "nay" was a vote in support of the president's position.

357. S 625. Bankruptcy Overhaul/Republican Minimum Wage Increase. Domenici, R-N.M., amendment that would increase the minimum wage by \$1 an hour over three years, to \$5.50 an hour beginning March 1, 2000, to \$5.85 an hour beginning March 1, 2001, and to \$6.15 an hour beginning March 1, 2002. The amendment also would provide \$18.4 billion in tax cuts over five years. Adopted 54-44: R 53-1; D 1-43 (ND 0-37, SD 1-6). Nov. 9, 1999. A "nay" was a vote in support of the president's position.

358. S 625. Bankruptcy Overhaul/Predatory Lending. Gramm, R-Texas, motion to table (kill) the Durbin, D-Ill., amendment that would invalidate claims against borrowers if the creditor has committed material violations of the Truth in Lending Act, such as lending based on home equity without regard to the borrower's ability to repay or imposing illegal fees such as prepayment penalties. Motion agreed to 51-46: R 50-3; D 1-43 (ND 1-36, SD 0-7). Nov. 9, 1999.

359. S 625. Bankruptcy Overhaul/College-Age Credit Card Consumers. Hatch, R-Utah, motion to table (kill) the Dodd, D-Conn., amendment that would prohibit credit card issuers from issuing a card to any consumer under age 21 unless the consumer provides either parental consent or financial information indicating an independent means of repaying debt that may arise from the issuance. Motion agreed to 59-38: R 50-3; D 9-35 (ND 6-31, SD 3-4). Nov. 9, 1999.

360. S 625. Bankruptcy Overhaul/Drug Penalties. Hatch, R-Utah, amendment that would increase penalties for manufacturing amphetamines and methamphetamines and authorize funds for law enforcement efforts to reduce such activities. The amendment also would increase penalties for a variety of offenses, including possession of more than 50 grams of powder cocaine, distributing drugs to minors and drug trafficking near a school. Adopted 50-49: R 47-7; D 3-42 (ND 3-34, SD 0-8). Nov. 10, 1999. A "nay" was a vote in support of the president's position.
